

DESCRIBING OPTIONS

SIMPLE PRESENT

- Cash is the preferred method of payment.
- Japanese shops <u>accept</u> mobile payments.
- Vending machines usually <u>accept</u> coins and small bills.
- There <u>are</u> ATMs near most stations.
- Debit cards <u>are</u> not widely accepted.
- Japanese people <u>don't</u> tip.

CAN / CAN'T

- You <u>can</u> pay by credit card in many shops.
- You <u>can</u> withdraw money at convenience stores.
- You <u>can't</u> buy a SUICA IC card at the moment, but you <u>can</u> download the app onto your phone.
- You <u>can't</u> exchange money at convenience stores.

GIVING ADVICE

SHOULD / SHOULDN'T

- You should always carry some cash.
- You <u>should</u> download the SUICA or PASMO app.
- You <u>shouldn't</u> ask to exchange money in shops.

IF I WERE YOU, I WOULD/WOULDN'T

- If I were you, I'd carry some small change.
- If I were you, I wouldn't exchange money at the airport.

BE BETTER/COMPARATIVE TO ...

- <u>It's better to</u> pay for expensive things by credit card.
- <u>It's easier to</u> pay for trains by IC card.
- Sometimes <u>it's faster to</u> pay by a QR code payment service like PayPay or LINE Pay.
